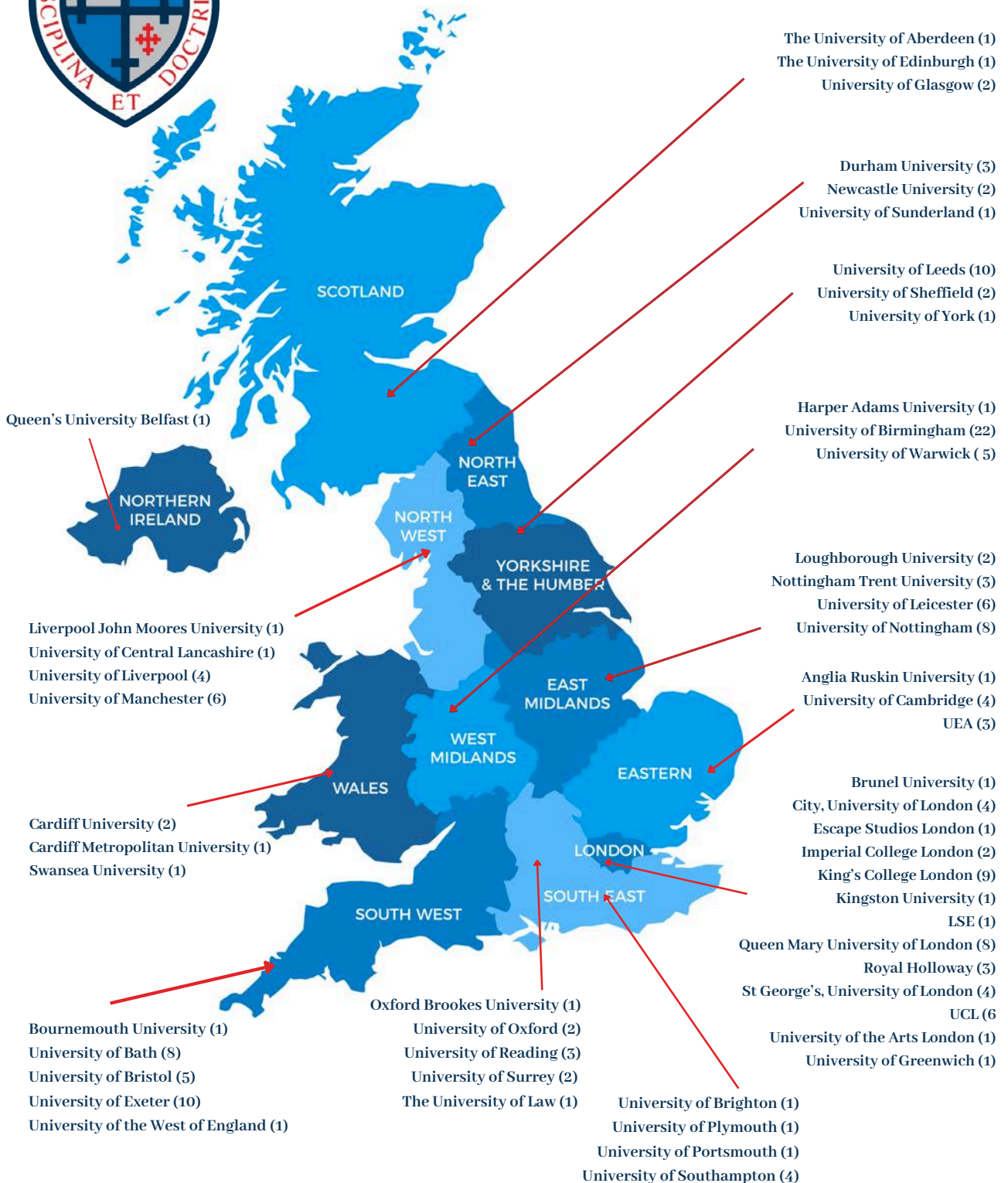

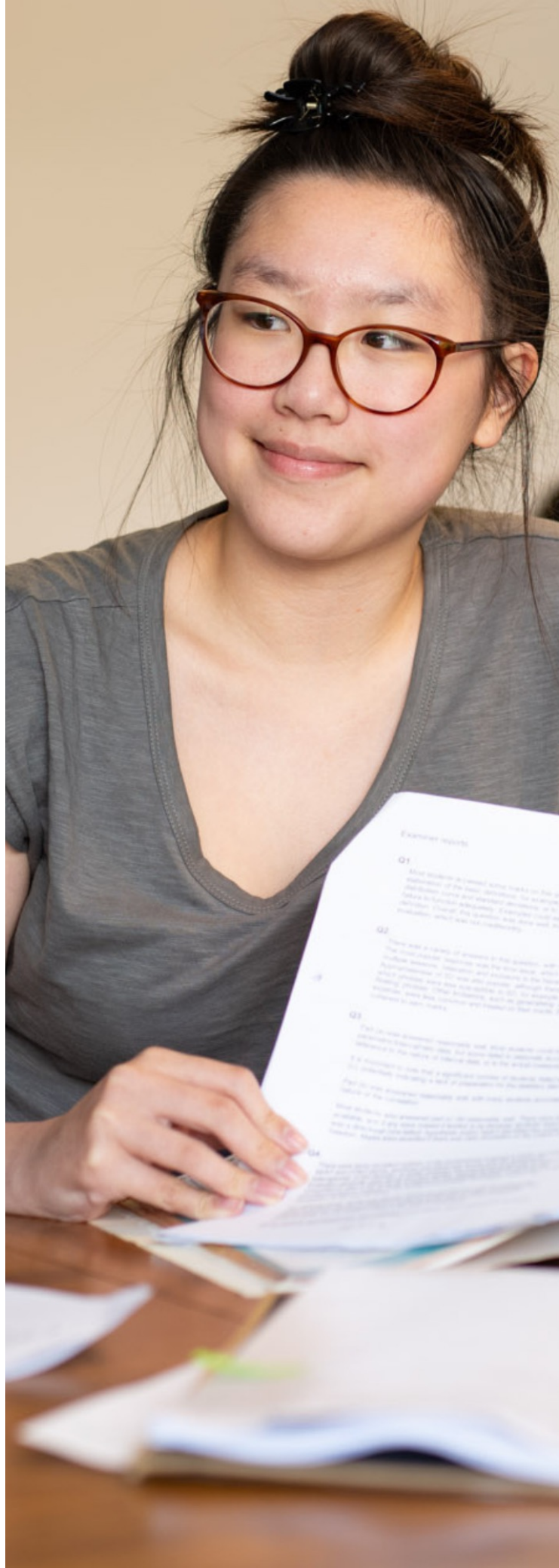
Academic Programme

At Beaconsfield High School Sixth Form, students typically study **three A-Level subjects**, which is the standard pathway for university entry. Alongside their academic studies, all students participate in our Enrichment Programme, which offers a wide range of opportunities to develop leadership, independence, and skills valued by universities and employers.

While some students may choose to study four A-Levels, this option requires careful consideration. Universities generally base offers on the three highest grades, and taking four subjects can increase workload and pressure, potentially impacting overall performance.

To be eligible for four A-Levels, students must achieve at least 64 points from their best eight GCSEs.

Students considering a STEM-related degree at a highly competitive university may wish to take Further Mathematics as a fourth subject. Those who show exceptional strength in Maths and Further Maths but narrowly miss the 64-point threshold may be considered on a case-by-case basis.





Choosing your A-level subjects

Choosing your A-Levels is an exciting chance to shape your future. Start by selecting subjects you enjoy and do well in them. These are often the ones where you'll thrive. Think about how your choices align with your university or career ambitions. Some degrees require specific A-Levels, so it's important to check entry requirements early. If you're unsure, a balanced mix of subjects can help keep your options open.

Whether you're aiming for Oxbridge, a conservatoire, a degree apprenticeship, or an overseas university, our team is here to support you every step of the way. The next page lists degrees with suggested A-Level subjects - a great place to begin your planning.

Talk to subject teachers, current Sixth Form students, and a careers advisor. They can offer valuable insights into what each course involves and how it fits with your goals. Making informed choices now will help you feel confident and motivated throughout your A-Level journey.

Suggested A-level combination

American Studies	English or history.
Accounting	Maths preferred. Economics and business useful.
Archaeology	History, English, geography, biology and chemistry. Most other subjects considered.
Architecture	Maths and physics useful. Evidence of artistic ability normally required (A level or GCSE).
Biochemistry	Chemistry essential and maths, physics or biology.
Biomedical Science	Biology and chemistry plus computing, maths or physics.
Biology/Botany/Ecology/ Zoology	Chemistry and biology.
Business	Maths, business and economics useful. MFL for joint honours, for example business studies and Spanish.
Chemical Engineering	Maths essential, chemistry or physics strongly preferred plus one other academic subject.
Chemistry	Chemistry essential and at least one from maths, physics or biology.
Classics	Latin and classics. History, English, philosophy and MFL also useful.
Computer Science	Maths essential, further maths essential for some courses and strongly preferred. Computing or physics preferable.
Dance/Performing Arts	Dance/ Drama. Musical ability usually above a certain grade-Instrument/singing. Entry usually by interview and audition.
Dentistry	Chemistry, biology and either maths or physics.
Economics	Maths strongly preferred. Business or economics useful. Further maths for top universities and degrees.
Education	Specific A-Levels not required unless taking a subject based degree.
Engineering (Civil, Electronic, Production and Mechanical)	Maths and physics essential. Further maths useful and one other science subject also recommended.
English	English + any humanities subject. Classics and Latin useful. For certain courses MFL is also useful.
Fine Art/Art	Art + portfolio. History or English helpful.
Food Science/Nutrition	One or two science subjects from chemistry, maths, physics and biology.
Geography	Geography preferred + biology, chemistry, computer science, maths, physics and psychology useful.
Geology	Combination of the sciences and geography useful.
Government & Politics	Politics, history, economics, maths, philosophy and ethics, sociology.
History	History, politics + English, MFL, classics or Latin.
Law	History, economics, English, politics, religious studies, latin, sociology.
Maths	Maths essential. Further maths strongly preferable and essential for some courses. Physics.
Medicine	Chemistry and biology and one other science subject.
Modern Foreign Language	A-Level in the main language + one other language (can include Latin).
Music	Music and Grade 8 performance preferred.
Nursing	One A-Level from any science subject strongly preferred plus two other A-Levels.
Optometry	Minimum of two sciences plus any other A-Level but not general studies.
Pharmacy/Pharmacology	Chemistry and two from maths, physics or biology.
Philosophy	Maths, politics, classics, philosophy and ethics. Maths, English and history can also be useful.
Physics	Physics and maths. Other science subject also useful.
Psychology	Psychology or a science useful. Maths essential for many courses.
Sociology (including social Sports Science)	Economics, history and maths useful. A-Level sociology not always required.
Theology/Religious Studies	Two science subjects, psychology, PE
Veterinary Science	Religious studies useful. One essay based A-Levels strongly recommended are English, history and classics. Latin and Greek GCSE are also a big advantage.

Enrichment Programme

All Sixth Form students participate in our Enrichment Programme, designed to develop leadership, independence, and wider skills valued by universities and employers. Students have the option to apply for or choose from the following opportunities:

- **Extended Project Qualification** – limited spaces available; application required
- **Sports Leaders Award** – paid programme
- **Dance Leaders** – paid programme
- **Duke of Edinburgh Award** – paid programme
- **Young Enterprise** – limited places available; application required
- **Volunteering outside of school** – minimum 1 hour per week
- **Supporting a department or leading a club within school** – minimum 1 hour per week
- **Participating in elite Sport**
- **Working towards an additional qualification outside of school**, e.g. performing arts, musical instrument, academic qualification

The Extended Project Qualification

The EPQ is an exciting opportunity to research a topic that inspires you and create a dissertation, investigation, artefact, or performance related to your chosen area. It develops independence, wider reading, and university-level study skills, and is highly regarded by universities - many make lower A-level offers to students who achieve a strong EPQ grade.

This AQA qualification is graded from A to E* and can earn up to 28 UCAS points. It suits students who are self-motivated, organised, and passionate, as supervisors act as facilitators rather than traditional teachers.

The EPQ is open to students achieving at least a Grade 6 in English or a Humanities subject, and who are studying no more than 3 A Levels. Spaces are limited, and there is also an application process which considers the quality of the bridging work students complete over the summer break.





Young Enterprise

Young Enterprise is a national charity that empowers young people to develop the skills, knowledge and confidence they need to succeed in the world of work.

Through a hands-on programme called the Company Programme, students work in teams to set up and run their own real business, gaining experience in entrepreneurship, teamwork, problem-solving and financial management. It's a fantastic opportunity to build employability skills and explore future career pathways in a practical, engaging way.

Students typically attend weekly meetings and contribute to running a real business, requiring commitment, teamwork, and good time management throughout the year. Places are limited and require an application.

Dance Leaders Award

The Dance Leaders Award gives students the opportunity to develop leadership skills through dance. They learn to plan and deliver sessions, gaining confidence and communication skills. Students pay to take part in the programme.

Sports Leaders Programme

The Sports Leaders Level 3 Programme is a nationally recognised qualification that develops leadership skills through sport and physical activity. Students gain practical experience planning and leading sessions, while building confidence, communication and teamwork. Please note that students are required to pay to participate in this programme.

Duke of Edinburgh Award

DofE is a prestigious programme that challenges students through volunteering, physical activity, skills development, expeditions, and a residential experience. It builds resilience, leadership and independence. Students pay to take part in the programme.



SPORT & ACTIVITIES PROGRAMME

Whatever your sporting ability, our Sixth Form games afternoon is a fantastic way to stay active, healthy and connected. Students can join senior teams competing at national level in indoor and outdoor hockey, netball, dance and gymnastics, or take part in recreational activities such as yoga, badminton and tennis. It's a great opportunity to unwind, build friendships and enjoy sport in a supportive environment.

UCAS PROGRAMME

We're ambitious for every Becky High Sixth student, and our UCAS support programme is designed to guide you through every stage of your university application. From initial research to final submission, you'll receive tailored advice from Form Tutors, subject staff, and our careers team. A dedicated UCAS and Futures Day helps students refine their goals, understand the application process, and begin drafting strong personal statements. We're here to support you every step of the way.

DEGREE APPRENTICESHIPS

Degree apprenticeships offer a great opportunity to study for a degree whilst in full time work, providing the opportunity to earn and gain work experience.

The school fully supports degree apprenticeship applicants from the start of the application process, through to providing support for interviews and assessment centres.

Our PSHE programme continues throughout the Sixth Form and is embedded within our enrichment series and dedicated lessons. Learning and Well-Being Review Days are held twice a year for both Year 12 and Year 13 students. These are one-to-one interactions between a tutor and tutee. This invaluable personalised approach provides individual attention and tailored support for each student's learning and emotional needs.



Students also have one hour of Enrichment each week, which includes a wide variety of sessions designed to broaden their horizons. The series features talks from guest speakers sharing their career journeys, alumnae reflecting on life after leaving school, and insights into the diverse range of pathways available beyond Sixth Form. The programme is designed to inspire and inform, helping students make confident, well-informed decisions about their futures.



All students are encouraged to engage in volunteering and work experience, which not only helps them consider potential career paths but also offers valuable experiences for personal statements, interviews, and CVs. Work experience gives essential insights into real-world environments, allows students to establish useful contacts for the future, and provides an opportunity to develop critical soft skills that are beneficial in all areas of life.





Team Projects

We encourage all students to take part in team projects such as Duke of Edinburgh or Young Enterprise as these offer opportunities to mix with a wide range of people, gain leadership experience, and help improve self-awareness and self-confidence.

Trips and Visits

Expanding your knowledge outside of the classroom is important.

We offer a wide range of trips and experiences for Sixth Form students. Previous years have seen music trips to Prague, Barcelona and Edinburgh; sports tours to South Africa, geography trips to Iceland, inter-school and international conferences with the Model United Nations Club, the Biology Department trip to Juniper Hall in Dorking, theatre trips, dance workshops and a visit to CERN, the European Organisation for Nuclear Research. The recent Big Trip took students on a life changing trip to Borneo.

Creative Experiences

Our Performing Arts and Creative Arts Departments offer exciting opportunities to get involved in the creative side of our community.

In performing arts, students are encouraged to take a leading role in the annual whole school musical, supporting the creative team with choregraphing and leading rehearsals. A team of year 12 students run Dance Live, working on the entire production and we have previously won awards for this. There is a plethora of musical ensembles from choirs, orchestras and bands to get involved in or lead. The Chamber Choir has entered a number of competitions and won numerous awards.

Students can take part in Bar Mock Trial to build public speaking skills, the School Production for stage or behind-the-scenes experience, and *Poetry by Heart* to improve memorisation and performance. These activities foster creativity, confidence, and valuable skills.

For artists, our hallways are your gallery; but we don't stop there, we work with local businesses to showcase your talent to the wider community too.





Community Spirit

The Becky High community is what makes us so special and it's what brings students together across the year groups.

Our Equality and Diversity Senior Prefects develop a calendar of engaging events to ensure Sixth Formers connect across the two years. The annual Sports Dinner organised by the PE Department celebrates the outstanding sporting achievements of our students.

Our Charities Prefects organise events to raise money for the school's chosen charities (over £20k last year), our Heads of Houses run inter-house competitions across all year groups to build House spirit and connect the year groups and of course, there's the end of term BBQ and Prom in the summer term for our Year 13 leavers.

Sixth Form students also volunteer in the local community and provide an in-house mentoring service for students through our Blossom and Guardian Angel programmes.

Student Leadership

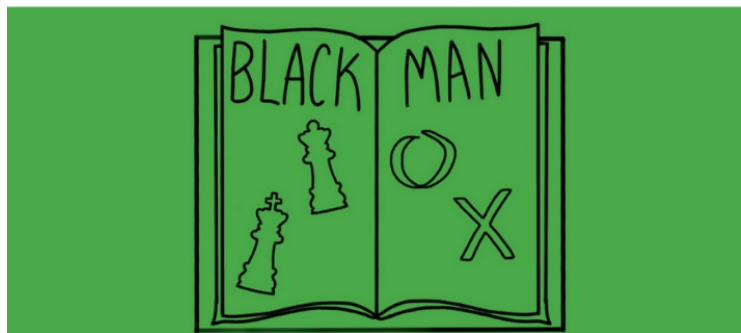

Applying to join us

We welcome applications for Sixth Form entry in September 2026 from students who are motivated, hardworking, academically ambitious, and ready to shape their future with purpose.

Students are required to achieve a minimum of 46 points from their best eight GCSEs, including a minimum of GCSE Grade 5 in both English Language or English Literature and Mathematics. In addition, students must meet the entry requirements for each of the A-Level courses listed on the next page. Please refer to our Admissions Policy [here](#) for more information.

At Becky High Sixth, most students study three A-Levels, the standard route for university entry. A few may choose four, but this requires careful consideration, as universities typically base offers on the top three grades. To be eligible for four A-Levels, students must achieve at least 64 points from their best eight GCSEs.

A-Level Entry Criteria 2026 - 27

To be eligible for A-Level study, students must achieve a minimum of 46 points from their best eight GCSEs, including at least a Grade 5 in both English and Maths. In addition to these general requirements, subject-specific entry criteria must also be met, as outlined in the table below.
