Since 1966, Beaconsfield High School has been a thriving community of happy, high achieving students.

We are proud to be a centre of excellence, demonstrated by our summer 2025 results on page 7. Our 1200+ pupils are challenged by remarkable teaching standards and benefit from the attention and proficient, of highly respect dedicated and conscientious staff. Staff are empowered to provide students with consistently inspiring experiences, backed by strong assessment and reporting, all of which ensure students have the tools to be motivated and driven learners.

Our students bring with them a melting pot of abilities, interests and outlooks, which is what makes our school community so exciting. Each year group is split into six form groups, named after one of our Houses – Blackman, Bhutto, Hamilton, Holmes, Parks and Rambert – themselves a nod to six exceptional and inspiring women.

# Six reasons to study with us

Our tutors, heads of learning and teaching staff are experts in supporting and guiding students through the many stages of secondary school and growing up. From Induction Day and summer camp in July, new students are welcomed into our community by current students. Once Year 7 have started with us they are allocated a Guardian Angel mentor. These sixth formers have been trained by the mental health charity Bucks Mind and are here to support our younger students.





Leadership, teamwork, creativity and independent thinking are skills we nurture and encourage in all our students from day one. As a school, and as individuals, we pride ourselves on being progressive and dynamic in everything we do. Our community is a diverse mix of cultures, religions and ethnicities, all of which further develops students' understanding of the society we live in, facilitating tolerance, respect and broad thinking.

Our teaching staff are specialists in their chosen subjects and bring with them an exceptional level of talent, and a variety of relevant backgrounds. From working in the corporate world, to gaining doctorates in their field, students enjoy all the benefits our remarkable staff bring. We offer students a portfolio of subjects that provide them with a strong, comprehensive grounding, delivered in engaging and progressive styles.



Our Getting Life Ready initiative not only helps our Year 7s make the move from primary to secondary school, it's also the foundation upon which we will build remarkable learners and future citizens. The GLR curriculum fosters creative and critical thinking and teaches methods to develop resilience and resourcefulness. These skills enable students to deal with problems both academically and socially, which in turn allows them to take academic risks.





As a girls' school, we are acutely aware of the need to educate our students in all the career options available to them, regardless of historical gender stereotypes. Our students are encouraged to strive for the remarkable in whichever field they are passionate about. Careers events, workshops and talks are arranged by our careers team which allow students to explore a wide range of careers options.

We seek to discover and develop the full potential of each individual, however, there will be some students whose needs are so individual that special provision must be made. Our experienced Learning Support Department has its own suite of rooms which cater for one-to-one or group work support, Braille modifications and specialist support sessions.





# Our Lower School curriculum

From Year 7 to Year 9 our students study a broad curriculum that is designed to provide a rounded experience and the required preparation for their futures.

# Beyond the classroom

Education and development aren't limited to the classroom, which is why we offer over 100 co-curricular, travel and creative experiences.

We have many orchestras, ensembles, and choirs, and staff, parents and students enjoy watching students perform at termly concerts, smaller recitals and music competitions. There are a range of sports clubs and teams open to all, many of which are the foundation step for some of our elite players. There are many dance groups, some are for everyone, others are by audition only.

Senior Prefects run Art, Drama, Pride, STEAM, Amnesty International and Debate Club, as well as career-focused societies like Model United Nations and MedSoc. Some of the more unique offers include Chess Club, Carnegie Book Club, D&D Club, Great British Bake-Off Bakes and Coding Club.

There are educational trips ranging from theatre productions and visits to museums and art galleries, to music, dance and sports tours to South Africa, America and Australia. Our sports teams compete across the country, as do our dance troupes and gymnastic and cheer teams. There's an annual ski trip, Duke of Edinburgh expeditions, and the Year 7 Bushcraft Experience as well as subject specific trips to countries like Iceland, Spain, France, Eswatini, Borneo, Costa Rica and Italy.

Student talent is celebrated in our annual drama production, the dance show at a local theatre, music concerts, art exhibitions and the Sport and Dance Awards Dinner. You can also take part in the Mock Trial competition, the Shakespeare for Schools Festival, Poetry by Heart, Young Enterprise and the Duke of Edinburgh's Award.




# Our community

# Studying for your GCSEs

In Year 10 you begin your twoyear GCSE course. Alongside six compulsory subjects – three sciences, English language and literature, and maths – you will choose your preferred language (French, Spanish or Latin), a humanity or social science, and at least one creative course or PE.

Choosing your GCSEs in Year 9 is an important but exciting process, and we encourage our students to talk to subject teachers, form tutors, the Head of Learning, our Careers Leader, current Year 10 students and of course, their own parents/carers.

The process starts in February with a series of student assemblies, drop-in sessions with Subject Prefects and a parent information evening. We are there every step of the way to make sure our students are confident that their choices are the right ones for them. Our current GCSE curriculum is listed below. 

After graduating she joined the GB team and won the European and World Championships in 2022, in the women's four. At the Paris 2024 Olympic Rowing Regatta, she won a bronze in the Women's eight.

### Saliha Mahmood-Ahmed

After BHS, Saliha studied medicine at Kings College graduating in 2012. She is currently an NHS junior doctor training in gastroenterology. She has always had a passion for cooking and in 2017 won the BBC's MasterChef competition. # Useful information

**The school day** - Morning registration is 08:50 until 09:10, followed by two one-hour periods (lessons). Break is 20 minutes, followed by two more periods, then lunch which is one hour (13:30-14:30). The final period finishes at 15:30.

**Howework** - We know homework can be a whole new experience for some of our Year 7s, which is why we provide a homework timetable showing the days homework for each subject needs to be completed and the length of time it should take. Students are expected to complete around one hour of homework a night, five days a week. We introduce homework gradually at the start of Year 7, so students can get used to the new expectations and routines.

Chartered Librarian. The LRC promotes reading for pleasure, provides resources to suit students' studies, develops students' information literacy skills, provides study space and computers, and manages textbook issues. Mrs Seal also offers the opportunity to take part in the Bucks Book Awards, the Carnegie Children's Book Award, book groups and many other competitions and author visits.

**Biometric system** - The school operates a no-cash policy. Instead, we have an online payment facility that parents/carers can top up in order for their child to buy food from the cafeteria. School trip payments are also made using this system. Students use the biometric system of a scanned thumb print to loan books from the Learning Resource Centre.

**Device Scheme** – Access to technology supports and empowers students to manage their learning, for example by being independent and having the ability to conduct their own research. For this reason, we require parents to sign up to our laptop scheme when their child joins us. The scheme allows for peace of mind as there is insurance available, and the school's safeguarding and monitoring software is loaded onto the laptops before we take delivery of them.
