





On Thursday 10th October, Mae Munuo from Complicite Theatre Company came to School to run a 3 hour workshop with our A-Level Drama students. The workshop focused on devising skills and physical theatre techniques, supporting the students with the Component 1 aspect of their course which needs to clearly show the influence of a practitioner. The workshop certainly put the students through their paces and was incredibly beneficial (whilst being really enjoyable too!).



Our Year 8 students have been enjoying learning about the National Theatre's production of War Horse in their Drama lessons. One aspect of this has been exploring how they can use Physical Theatre and Stylised Still Images to convey challenging locations such as WW1 trenches and a WW1 Tank. We have been so impressed with their mature attitude, focus and inventive responses.

'Restart a Heart with Year 11



On Tuesday 15th October, all Year 11 students had an hour long session with two trained medical volunteers for "Restart a heart" day. All the students learned the basics of CPR, how to do a primary survey in the event of finding someone unconscious and the "DRABC" acronym. They also learned about defibrilators, and the difference between a heart attack and cardiac arrest. A Visit to Homerton College written by Myr. 11 RAM

During our trip to Cambridge, we had the chance to experience a wide range of activities that provided an indepth look into university life, academic opportunities, and the historic charm of the city. The day began with a introduction to the universities of Cambridge, where we engaged with current students. They shared their insights and personal experiences, giving us a better understanding of what it's like to study at Cambridge. We found this quite interesting because we could ask questions about student life, academic challenges, and how they balance their studies with other activities. It felt reassuring to hear from students who had been in our position.

Next, we had a tour around the campus, which allowed us to explore one of Cambridge's historic colleges. We enjoyed walking through the beautiful campus grounds and learning about the history and unique traditions of Homerton College. One of the key moments was the 'escape room' puzzles, which engaged our problem-solving and critical thinking skills that we learnt is needed for university studies. Finally, the Cambridge city tour was a wonderful way to end the trip. We got to see the city's historic landmarks and the student ambassadors who led the tour were knowledgeable and engaging, overall enhancing the experience even more.
